International Baccalaureate Programme: Making a World of Difference

How do we help all children succeed in school, and beyond? How do we ensure the highest level of academic performance for students in our public schools?

These are questions the Cook Family Foundation has sought to help answer through its active involvement and its grant-making. In 2007, we began to make investments to help bring the International Baccalaureate (IB) Programme to the Owosso Public Schools. Over \$300,000 in grants to the Owosso Public Schools have enabled the training and professional development of more than 150 teachers and administrators in IB teaching methods at all grade levels.

The purpose of the IB model of instruction is to help students be adaptable problem solvers, make real world connections to their subject matter, and explore global issues. As one fifth grade teacher reported "It is important to get students to think!" The IB curriculum focuses on helping students to become self-directed learners able to gather, analyze, and apply knowledge. The most measurable success has been Middle Years Programme certification for grades 6-10, including the Owosso Middle School. As the Owosso Public Schools prepare its students for the future, the IB approach to teaching will make a world of difference.

"Teachers are collaborating across the disciplines so that students experience learning that is more relevant. We are beginning to see wonderful crossover in project based learning that leads to community action and service toward the betterment of our world."

Goals for 2014

Six goals will guide the work of the Cook Family Foundation in 2014 and the years beyond as we work with local partners to improve our community. These goals bring focus to our work with the Nonprofit Capacity Building Program, our engagement in community partnerships, and our grant making.

Encourage the highest level of academic success for our community's young people.

The first grants ever given by the Foundation were a scholarship to the University of Michigan and support for improvements at Owosso High School. We will continue to provide a scholarship to every high school graduate from the Shiawassee County region who attends the University of Michigan. In 2014 we are working with the Shiawassee Post-secondary Access Network (SPAN) to help more students be prepared for, and take advantage of, college and training opportunities.

Expand the capacity of community-based nonprofits to more effectively carry out their mission and serve the residents of Shiawassee County.

Our Nonprofit Capacity Building Program provides professional development and technical assistance to local nonprofits, and the Foundation will make further strategic investments in community organizations to enable their growth.

Foster the Shiawassee River as a source of pride for the community.

In addition to its ongoing support for the Friends of the Shiawassee River, in 2014 the Foundation initiates a multi-year effort with The Nature Conservancy to apply science and economics to reduce polluted runoff. Because the Shiawassee River flows into Saginaw Bay, the Foundation partners with other funders through the Saginaw Bay Watershed Initiative Network.

Promote the arts and history as strong cultural cornerstones of the community.

Perhaps the most exciting news in 2014 in both the arts and history will be the re-opening of the former Capitol Theater as the Shiawassee Performing Arts Center in downtown Owosso. The Foundation has invested in this restoration and is working now to support the organizational growth of the Owosso Community Players to take advantage of this new theater.

Help care for and protect the most vulnerable members of our community.

Several human service organizations are part of the Foundation's Nonprofit Capacity Building Program, and the Foundation will look for ways to support cooperative efforts to help those in need, such as the Great Start Shiawassee early childhood collaborative.

Increase opportunities for community collaboration and engagement among and between local nonprofits, arts organizations, government, students, and citizens.

"None of us alone is as smart as all of us together" is a value embodied in the Foundation's support for truly cooperative efforts to tackle community challenges. In 2014, we are actively looking to help organizations initiate collaborations. We will also continue the Owosso Fellowship which brings together students supported by Foundation scholarships to work in local nonprofits and to learn with each other and the community.









The Shiawassee River defines the southern edge of this watershed and it flows north to form, along with four other streams, the Saginaw River.
